

Why is Council asking for feedback?

The Greerton Maarawaewae Study was initiated to identify the best use of the 85ha of Racecourse Reserve land to support wellbeing and liveability as the city continues to grow. And because the leases on the reserve land expire in 17 years, there was also a need to provide certainty to existing leaseholders.

The first part of the Study focused on ensuring as many people as possible were able to have input into identifying *potential best uses* of this reserve land.

Over the course of the study (November 2021 to June 2022) the independent study team developed 10 options in total. You can find a link to them all here: www.tauranga.govt.nz/greertonmaarawaewae

Health and recreation

This is Council's preferred option

Pros

Provides a site for a new health precinct – featuring integrated health and community wellbeing services. Benefits of this site include:

- the ability to design fit-for-purpose, future-focused healthcare facilities; with these being designed to accommodate expansion and growth in the Bay of Plenty district for decades to come
- enhanced access to all major highways; connecting the Eastern Bay,
 Western Bay and wider area, as part of a network of regional healthcare services
- undertaking necessary expansion of Tauranga Hospital on its current site
 would be extremely difficult and disruptive given how busy the hospital is.
 Building a new health precinct on the Greerton Maarawaewae site could
 allow a much shorter build time and would be significantly more practical
- the potential for the existing hospital site to be used for housing

Provides more green space, recreational areas and community facilities for the benefit of the whole community (in line with the community engagement outcomes)

Good connectivity between the key uses of this site – health and recreation - with the healthcare facilities providing great passive surveillance opportunities over the green space

Blending healthcare services into a more natural environment provides a better healing environment for patients and service users

Provides opportunities to enhance cultural values and narratives over the entire area

Much higher levels of public and community use of the reserve land

Central park

The majority of the community feedback was about maximising the use of this land as reserves and parks – playgrounds, walkways, gardens and with multiple types of recreational and community uses

Provides opportunities to enhance cultural values and narratives over the entire area

Much higher levels of public and community use of the reserve land

Cons

Requires relocation of the existing Tauranga Racecourse and equestrian facilities

Does not support broader city needs such as health and/or housing

Enhanced status quo

- racecourse, golf, equestrian, sportsfields and connections to Kopurererua Valley

Pros

Existing uses could continue although equestrian would be in a smaller space

Provides for some active recreation and community facility needs

Cons

Potential clash between equestrian use and sportsfields

Is limited in ability to support green, recreational and community space for wider public benefit (given the space requirements for racing and equestrian activities)

Does not support broader city needs such as health and/or housing



- Racecourse
- Golf course
- Sportsfields/artificial turfs within the Racecourse area
- Possible community centre with multipurpose bookable rooms

Other information

The Crown (the Government) owns all 85ha of the reserve land Council is the administering body (Council does not own the land)

The Tauranga Racecourse Reserve Charitable Trust manages the leases on behalf of Council.

Ngāi Tamarāwaho hapū has advised that it supports the ongoing recreation reserve status of the land and would seek to have land ownership discussions should an alternative or revised use be proposed.

A formal statement of claim has been lodged with the Waitangi Tribunal.

The Tauranga Racecourse was established in 1874.



12 race meetings annually

The Tauranga Equestrian Sports Association also operates within the racecourse area. The Tauranga Golf Club was established in 1914.







What will happen to the Racecourse if it has to move?

A Racing Working Group has been set up with representatives from New Zealand Thoroughbred Racing (NZTR).

This Working Group is looking at the future of thoroughbred racing across the entire Bay of Plenty region. It will also look at options for an equestrian eventing facility.

The Future of Tauranga Hospital

In response to ongoing population growth pressures and seismic upgrading requirements, Te Whatu Ora (Health New Zealand) is exploring options for the expansion and upgrading of Tauranga Hospital.

A business case is currently under development for the provision of a new clinical services block, however building this on the existing Cameron Road site would be difficult given the busyness of the campus. Therefore, one of the options being considered is the potential to build new facilities on a greenfield site/or sites. This would allow the current hospital to continue to function, unaffected by major construction works.

It's important to emphasise that any new build or major expansion is some years away and would be subject to funding approval. There is still much work to be completed on what the best configuration of services, be that on one or across several sites, would look like. Papamoa is also an area of key consideration in our current planning work.

The Greerton Maarawaewae land could provide an ideal opportunity for the creation of a health and wellbeing services precinct. This would comprise an area of integrated services created in a natural environment, more easily accessible from all directions than the current main hospital site, and with available space to help future-proof health services for many decades to come.

A greenfield development option would also provide a unique opportunity to re-think the design and configuration of essential health services rather than just trying to recreate a traditional, institutional hospital building.

Healthcare and how people access services is changing rapidly, with increasing use of telehealth, services moving out of the hospital into communities, and an imperative increasing focus on wellbeing and prevention. These shifts mean that our hospitals of the future need to be designed for a different context and changing needs as well as addressing essential hospitallevel capacity for our growing population in the Bay.

Potential options for a health precinct could include community aged care, rehabilitation, youth wellbeing services, primary care, diagnostics, mental health, surgical facilities and inpatient accommodation. There are many options for how we might design our services for the future across one, or more than one, site.

These options will need public and key health partner stakeholder conversations to make sure we co-design the best possible configuration of health and wellbeing services for the city and the wider Bay of Plenty. "It is especially important that any health facility developments are in full partnership with mana whenua."
